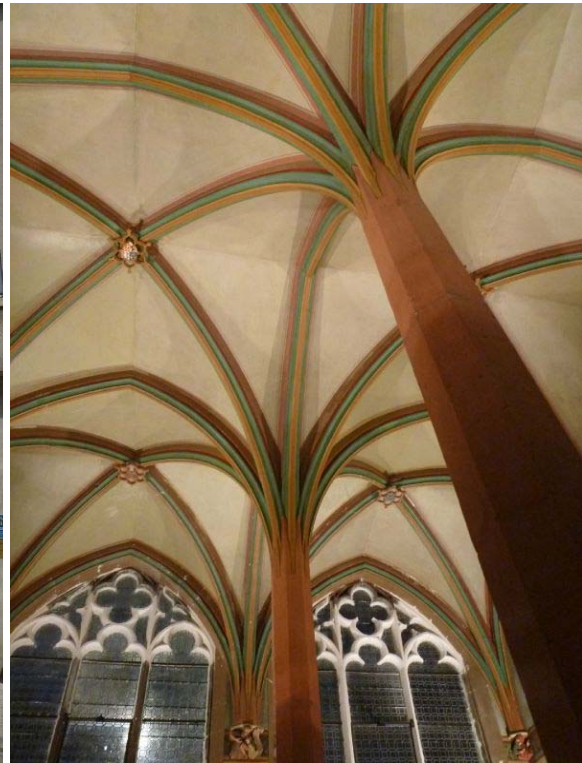

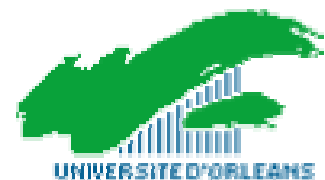

The ATM Development Days are held in partnership with a university annually

The topic of the 28th conference will focus on “International mobilities, disequilibria and development: towards a sustainable development and a carbon-free globalization?”.

After decades of markets and borders openness (goods, services, labor, capital) and while some challenges, probably underestimated until so far, hit north and south societies (ecological and social sustainability of world growth process), time has come to question the international mobility postulate as a development factor.

Economics has seemed to imprudently overcome distance problems and geography (on physical, human and political dimensions) is maybe taking its revenge. Some call for a reverse process of “deglobalization”. In continuation with topics from previous conferences, questions like proximity scales, location relevance or subsidiarity of actions will be on the agenda

International mobilities and the globalization process are generally presented as profitable for income level, potential growth or organizational efficiency. Insertion in international trade, domestic deregulation, foreign capital attractiveness and labor market fluidity are often recommended by the dominant paradigm (old or new *Washington Consensus*). But related costs seemed to be underestimated by basic theoretical model with too much simplifying assumptions or crude empirical studies. Supporters of outward looking economic policies understated transitory dynamics and rather promoted static comparative approaches easier to design. Phenomena like poverty traps, sectoral restructuring, external shocks on the balance of payments, migration humps or political and social integration conflicts are not correctly addressed by reform strategies. It is also the case for the need of transfers, technological leaps and for the impact of globalization on the rhythm of ecological upheavals. If economic development can be conceived essentially as an unbalancing process through internal polarizations generating spillover and binding effects, then the past three decades introduced a new pressure with globalization and its shocks.

Communication proposals shall focus on this orientation but in a large meaning with numerous possible themes. As it was the case in previous years, this conference aims at promoting the opportunity for researchers from various disciplines to meet and to contribute to federate their work around this topic and to confront their experiences and analyses.

Carbon-free globalization, why this special feature? Sustainable development is a multidimensional concept including environmental, economic and social aspects. But the ecological urgency is now a core issue not only for developed countries but also for the emerging ones and more evidently for less-developed, weakened regions. Is it possible for societies and governments to conciliate durably world economy model with a necessary reduction of the ecological footprint of human activities? Without being exclusive, it this is really the prior orientation of our 28th ATM development days

Themes

Written proposals from disciplines across the humanities and social sciences are welcome. These should not exceed 2 pages in length, and state the issue to be addressed, methodology, principal findings and references. Papers should deal with at least one of the issues of the following workshops. They may address theoretical, methodological or empirical questions.

Session A: Challenges, an overview of new global disequilibria

- A1 ecological and technological challenges: *an altered physical geography* (depletion of resources, environmental irreversibility, climate as a global public good,...)
- A2 human, social and demographic challenges: *a human geography under pressure* (demographic disequilibria, official and unofficial labor migration, vulnerabilities,...)
- A3 Commercial and economic challenges: *an unbalanced globalization* (competitiveness and trade, services liberalization, growth and inequalities,...)
- A4 institutional and geopolitical challenges: *balances of power in mutation* (world governance, regional blocks, conflicts and terrorism,...)
- A5 monetary and financial challenges: *crises and instabilities* (debt and capital flows, international monetary system, banking sector,...)

Session B: Emergences, some paths in exploration

- B1 new geopolitical equilibria, signs of multipolarization: *international institutions reform and leadership* (IFIs in mutation?, BRICs,...)
- B2 new commercial and financial regulations: *safeguard clause and risk management* (comeback of protection?, prudential behavior, rating agencies,...)
- B3 modes of production, consumption and exchange: *from economic geography to ecological economics* (short production chains, relocalization, ecological footprint, ecosystems,...)
- B4 migration and human development: *brain drain, brain gain ou brain waste ?* (education, migration flows labor market, foreign workers' remises,...)
- B5 infrastructures, transport et urbanization : *What territories for economic activities and social life?* (flows management, housing, urban spaces, ecomobility,...)

Session C: Criteria for evaluation of new potential paradigm

- C1 Economic and social proximity: *What relevant space for economic analysis and subsidiarity of policies?* (local systems, networks, microfinance, cultural and historical foundations of regional cooperations ,...)
- C2 Responsibility of actors: *including new dimensions in decision process* (Corporate Social Responsibility, social rating, loyalty and social clause in trade, core labor standards, labels and traceability,...)
- C3 Durability: *a new time horizon for economic choices?* (short term/long term, sobriety in ways of life, recycling economy,...)
- C4 Reciprocity: *economic value of social ties and solidarity economy* (social capital, fair trade, sustainable tourism,...)
- C5 Solidarity: *tax system and public policies* (competition or fiscal cooperation?, international taxes, economic sovereignty, public sectors,...)

Session D: Doctoral student session

- D1 This session will give the opportunity to Development Studies doctoral students working on otherwise unrelated areas to the themes of the symposium to present their work in progress.
